Did you know?

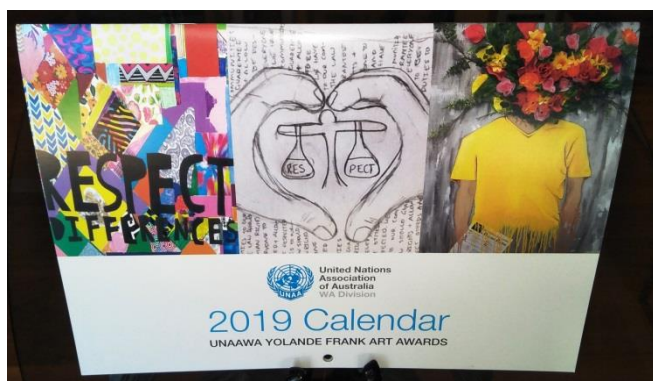
The SDGs (or Global Goals) are supported by 169 **Targets** (specifically, what aspects of this Goal does our community need to achieve?) and several **Indicators** for each Target (what data will we collect to inform us whether we are achieving the Target?). In a time of great change (globalisation/automation/ climate change/mass migration) the Goals give us a framework (road map) to plan for the future. Youngsters emotionally engage with the Goals – after all we are talking about their future!

The 17 Goals are interdependent, forming three broad themes (a.k.a. TRIPLE BOTTOM LINE) **PLANET** (Environment) **PEOPLE** (Society) and **PROSPERITY** (Economy) and two strategies **PEACE** and **PARTNERSHIPS**.

Human Rights underpin all of the Global Goals. 2018 marks the 70th anniversary of the signing of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights – a first in the history of humankind.

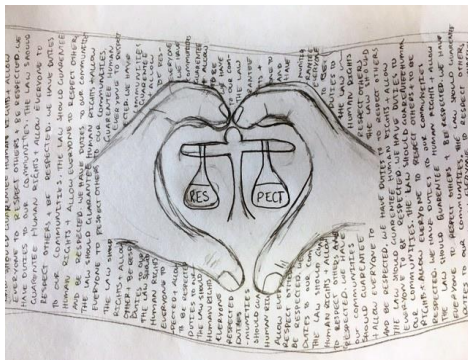
